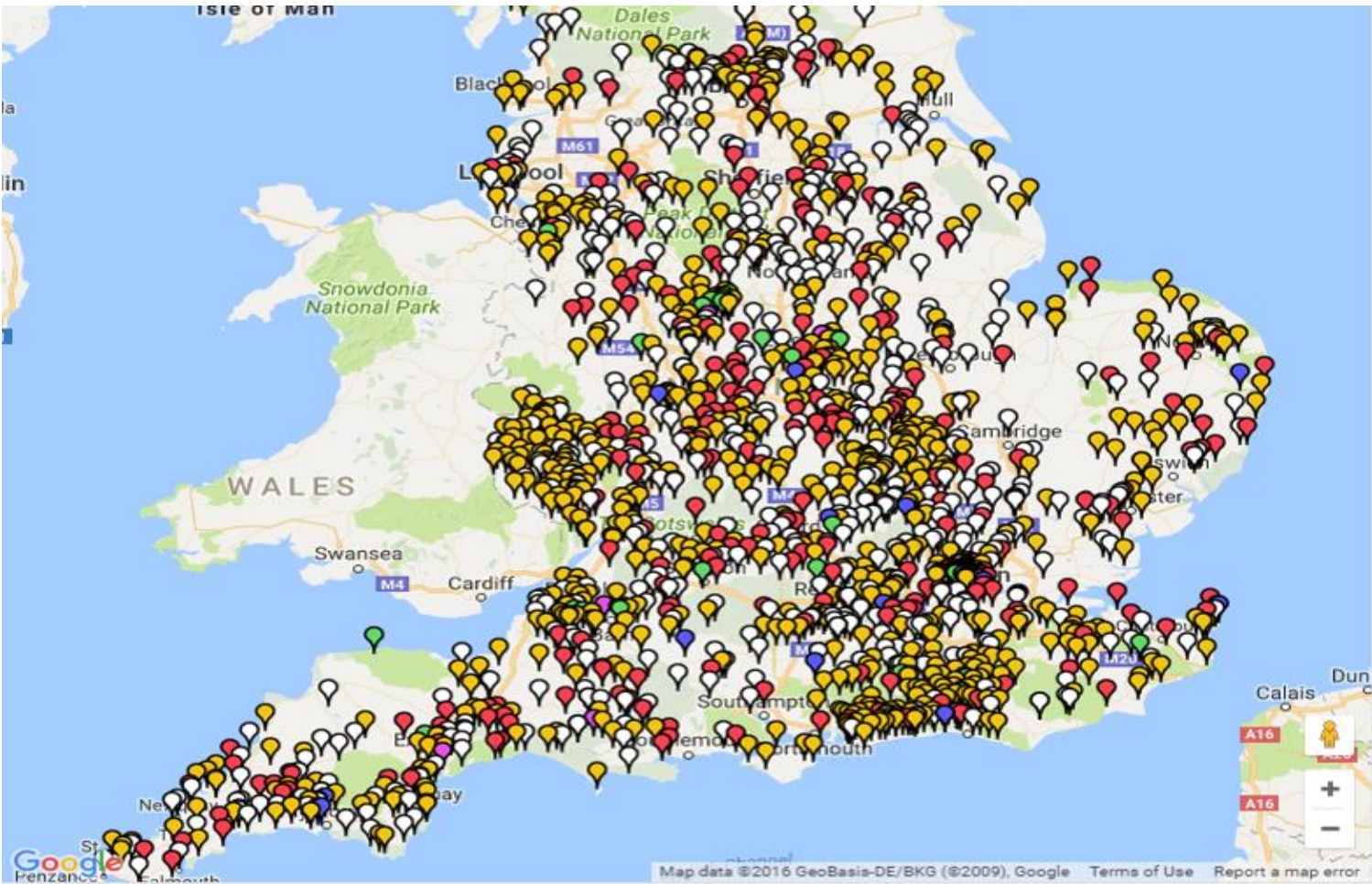
Confidence Through Networking

You all have the same task - to produce **four** documents to submit to your **local planning authority** for independent examination and then to a referendum of residents/businesses:

- ✓ *A Map of your agreed Neighbourhood Plan area* - where your plan policies and proposals will apply
- ✓ *The Neighbourhood Plan itself* - policies and proposals about the use of land and buildings in a neighbourhood area
- ✓ *A Consultation Statement* - an account of who you spoke to about your plan and how it influenced its content
- ✓ *A Basic Conditions Statement* - how your plan meets requirements for sustainable development, EU regulations and fits with national and district planning policy from a neighbourhood perspective

Why Network?

There is no **problem** that someone, somewhere has not already had to **deal with** - both designated bodies and local planning authority officers and councillors

Issues people face in neighbourhood planning

Establishing Designated bodies in Urban Areas and Parishes agreeing to a plan

- Agreeing an area - straightforward sometimes, not so in others
- Joint Business and Resident Neighbourhood Planning
- Coping with NIMBYs and disagreements within designated bodies
- Engaging with the local planning authority, politicians, landowners and developers

Issues people face in neighbourhood planning

Writing a Neighbourhood Plan

- The lack of an up to date Local Plan
- Writing policy that is locally distinctive and will “stick”
- Designating sites
- Making sense of evidence and preparing your own.

Issues people face in neighbourhood planning

Getting organised and resourcing the process

- Making sure you don't lose the plot
- Getting people to invest their time
- Ways to share the work
- Creative ways to do it
- Becoming a planner
- Getting hold of some money.



Making the best of Networking

- People have examples to share - documents, templates, survey forms, policies that have been agreed in a finally “made” plan
- People have stories to tell - how they won people over - the arguments they used, the examples they used as precedents
- You can develop relationships with people with like minds who you can trust
- You get the satisfaction of helping others to solve problems.
