BATH AND NORTH EAST SOMERSET COUNCIL (PUBLIC FOOTPATHS BCTOW/4 AND BC55/14, BATHWICK) TEMPORARY TRAFFIC REGULATION ORDER 2024

Notice is given that Bath and North East Somerset Council in exercise of its powers under section 14 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 has made an order the effect of which will temporarily close:

- 1. The section of Public Footpath BCTOW/4 commencing from a junction with Bathwick Hill and continuing to its junction with Public Footpath BC55/14; and
- 2. The full length of Public Footpath BC55/14 commencing from its junction with Public Footpath BCTOW/4 and continuing to its junction with Sydney Road.

This order is required because works are being or are proposed to be executed on or near the right of way; namely the River & Canal Trust are carrying out tree felling works. The Order will come into force on 29th April 2024 and will be effective for **4 weeks**. The restriction may not be effected for the whole of the period but only for so long as is necessary to execute the works. This is anticipated to be between 8.00 and 16.00 for **5 days**. The closure will only be effective during the period when signs stating 'Footpath Closed' are in place on site.


