Development consisting of a change of the use of a building to a use falling within Class C4 (houses of multiple occupation) of the Schedule to the Town and Country Planning (Use Classes) Order 1987 (as amended) from a use falling within Class C3 (dwelling houses) of that Schedule being development comprised within Class I(b) of Part 3 of Schedule 2 to the Town And Country Planning (General Permitted Development) Order 1995 (as amended) and not being development comprised within any other Class.
