

2.2 What is the equalities profile of service users?

Children's Services support all children and young people across B&NES.

The B&NES Strategic Evidence Base https://www.bathnes.gov.uk/strategic-evidence : some key points:

- We have seen an increase of 10% in people aged 15-64 years and an increase of 7% in children under 15 years.
- There has been a small but notable increase in persons aged under 16 self-reporting as disabled (either limited a little or limited a lot) from 2011 (3%) to 2021 (7%).
- A larger increase in self-reported disability can be seen among the 16-49 age group, from 7% in 2011 to 13% in 2021.
- Gaps in education attainment are present for the Free School Meal (FSM) cohort and Special Educational Needs & Disability (SEND) cohort at all stages and between boys and girls.
- Key Stage 2 (KS2) attainment in the FSM cohort is the worst in the country and Early Years Foundation Stage Profile (EYFS) attainment in the FSM cohort is the 3rd worst in the country (2022/23).
- Estimates suggest 4,000 people in B&NES (including 1,500 children) will fall into absolute poverty in 2022/23. 13% of households in B&NES are estimated to be in Fuel Poverty. Increases in residents sometimes/often worried that food would run out (from 13% in 2022 to 18% in 2023).
- Rates of hospitalisation (2020/21) are increasing and comparatively high for
- Under 18 mental health
- Under 18 alcohol conditions
- Eating disorders
- Self-harm particularly for young women and girls.

^{*}There is no requirement within the public sector duty of the Equality Act to consider groups who may be disadvantaged due to socio economic status, or because of living in a rural area. However, these are significant issues within B&NES and have therefore been included here.

** The Equality Act does not cover armed forces community. However, the Armed Forces Bill (which came in on 22 Nov 2022) introduces a requirement to pay 'due regard' to make sure the Armed Forces Community are not disadvantaged when accessing public services.

***The Equality Act does not cover care experienced people. B&NES adopted this group as a protected characteristic in March 2024 alongside over 80 other Local Authorities. Although we have data for care leavers and children/young people who are currently in the care of B&NES we do not have wider data on disadvantage experienced through being in care.
